

PE and Sports Funding 2016-17

Birkenhead High School Academy has a long tradition of valuing P.E. and Sport and endeavours to encourage all children to participate and develop healthy and active lifestyles. We are fortunate to receive extra funding from the government to support the work we do with all our students in this vital role. This year our funding is as follows:

Primary PE and Sports Grant Funding 2014-15	
Lump Sum received	£8000
Additional amount received £5 per pupil x 312 pupils	£1560
Total Amount Received	£9560

We plan to spend this as follows throughout the academic year:

- Completion of the afPE Quality Mark for Physical Education and Sport.
- Throughout the year the children will access high quality indoor and outdoor P.E. lessons, with KS2 pupils enjoying swimming lessons throughout the year in the school pool.
- Contribute towards a full-time sports specialist teacher who teaches PE, at times alongside the class teachers, so that their specialist skills are disseminated to our teaching staff through demonstrating and modelling good practice.
- Twilight training throughout the year for KS1 teaching staff, by a qualified specialist PE teacher
- Offer of a wide range of sporting activities for all ages as part of our extensive extra-curricular programme.
- Residential trip organised each year to an Outdoor Adventure Centre, Manor Adventure in Shropshire. Year 5 pupils enjoy 5 days of physical, challenging, confidence building activities, subsidised for some, using PE funding
- Competitions/fixtures organised in a wide range of sports for all KS2 students. These take place outside the traditional school day, after school and on Saturdays. They are local and national activities, allowing the pupils to enjoy meeting and competing against pupils from other areas.
- Regular swimming galas with other schools, contributions towards the running of the pool
- Update PE equipment and resources
- Equip and train Y6 students to be play leaders for the KS1 students at lunchtimes
