Water Safety



As part of our PSHE curriculum, Mr. Dave Bates from the RNLI Hoylake visited our junior school on Thursday 25th May. He delivered workshops on water safety to all our children from nursery up to Year 6.

The children learnt how to spot a wide range of dangers, identify an emergency, understand the effect cold water has on our bodies and the RNLI's four key safety messages:

- Stay together
- Float

Polar Preet Visit

Junior School welcomed a special visitor to their assembly on Monday morning. Earlier this year, Preet Chandi, or 'Polar Preet' as we know her, returned from her second expedition to the Antarctic where she broke two Guinness World Records for both the longest solo unsupported oneway polar ski journey for a woman and the longest solo unsupported one-way solo ski journey.











Before she left on this expedition, Preet launched a nation-wide school competition to design a logo that could be turned into a sticker and stuck to the pulk (sled) that she would use to traverse Antarctica. We were delighted that Y6 pupil, Lupe Mendez-Quirk was one of the winners and even more delighted to discover that Preet would be hand-delivering Lupe's prize herself.

Preet gave an inspirational talk to all pupils from Year 2 to Year 6 about believing in yourself, pushing your own boundaries, and coping with disappointment and failure. We also had a go at pulling Preet's training tyres, Tyre One and Tyre Two across the hall before Lupe was presented with her special prize of a signed photograph and a test tube of genuine Antarctic snow (in its melted form!)



Even after Preet had left BHSA and was on her way to the next school visit, a buzz of energy could still be felt around the school. It's a visit that both pupils and staff will remember for a long time to come. Thank you Preet!

Science Investigation competition



The pupils in KS2 demonstrated their blossoming science skills during our Science Investigation Competition. One week in May saw the Junior School buzzing with exciting and imaginative ideas as the pupils independently planned and conducted investigations to find out the answers to the creative questions they had posed; questions such as "Who has the loudest scream?" and "Does the length of your arm affect how far you can throw a ball?" and "Does your age affect your memory?"

Congratulations to the winning team in 5M - Brooke, Faye and Imogen - who used our new data logging equipment to find out "Does the amount of air in a balloon affect how loudly it pops?"

Cryptic Codes

We've been learning about Enigma and how it was used in WWII by Germany to send encoded messages and how the team at Bletchley Park found flaws to crack it.

We've then made paper-based enigma machines out of tubes of Pringles! The pupils have discovered how they can encode and decode messages using these.





Five girls in Year 6 travelled down to Wimbledon High School to celebrate the 'We are one' sustainability project all GDST schools have taken part in. The girls made a

video to encourage behaviour change that would help to save the planet. On the day, Martha took part in a film discussing what the environment means to her. The girls were brilliant environmental ambassadors and were an excellent example of how enthusiastic our pupils can be!

Cathedrals visit

On March 17th all of Year 6 visited both Liverpool Cathedrals; Christ the King Metropolitan Cathedral and Liverpool Anglican Cathedral.

They were accompanied by the Year 10 Religious Studies GCSE students, who had spent their lesson leading up to the visit researching the two cathedrals and were able to explain the differences between them. The students walked along Hope Street and learnt all about how important it was to have two cathedrals in the city. We stopped by the sculptures outside LIPA to reflect upon times in recent history when many immigrants passed through the city of Liverpool on their way to start a new life in Ireland and North America.

Before we finished for half term we were fortunate enough to get funding to invite the Cells project into school. This is an organisation that uses ex-offenders to help students avoid the mistakes that they have made in life. They covered a huge amount of topics that supplement our PSHE curriculum such as joint enterprise, exploitation and grooming, prison life, drugs and alcohol, and the family perspective of those affected by prison.

The day was hugely successful and our students learnt some valuable lessons. To quote a student they didn't realise "how something small and little can turn into something big and effect the rest of your life" but they also realised because of the people who shared their stories that "you can always come back from your mistakes". A fantastic, worthwhile day.



The Cells Project

The RS department recently welcomed Mrs Michelle Hayward, Chair of Governors at King David High School in Liverpool, to talk to our Year 10 and 11 students about her faith. As an Orthodox Jewish woman, Michelle was able to tell them all about her role in shabbat. They were able to ask her questions about her beliefs and she talked them through some of the key practices of Judaism. The students were really engaged and learnt a lot, and it was an excellent revision of key topics the week before our students' Judaism paper.

Once again BHSA toom part in the Amazon App design competition this year. Our students submitted their app designs and ideas to Amazon just after the Easter holidays. Sally Cox, our Amazon ambassador, (Sally is pictured with our students above) visited us to help and support their ideas before the submission deadline. We were unfortunately unsuccessful in reaching the final this year but two of our teams received some excellent feedback from Amazon.

The feedback for team Quick Fit and their app called 'Keep quick! Get Fit!' was as follows - Amazing idea with catchy slogan, sticker and name to get people fit. Exercise is essential for maintaining good physical and mental health. I really like the data points presented on the benefits of this app, problem statement, how the user journey works. Great Job! The idea is simple yet effective and I like how you narrowed in on a young audience who are likely to be more active and benefit from the app's simplicity. You have clearly showed the journey of the app showing the initial wireframe and then implementing the feedback. Nice visual representation of the app journey, and feedback mechanism and its incorporation.

There is great level of details presented on the technology front, and how the app will help people. It would be great to see direct quotes from feedback and specific metrics to qualify your idea beyond speculation.

The feedback for team Wyzee was as follows - Loneliness is such a huge issue, and I agree with your group that it's only been exacerbated by COVID. I love that you've chosen such a worthwhile cause to tackle in your app. You've clearly thought through the feedback you received and made adjustments accordingly on your app design.

I'm impressed with your clear writing and well-articulated explanations. The stats you provided (63% increase of depression in young people during COVID) really grabbed me!

What an important problem to tackle. I love your app name and how you came to it and think there's some great ideas to help fight loneliness. Well done! This was fun and crea-

tive! Also, nice to see some sample photos, too.


